## Persona 1: Marcus Chen, 42

Evaluating news subscription options (Looking for tech industry coverage, willing to pay for quality journalism, needs mobile-friendly format) -- Austin, TX

### Personal Description

Marcus moved to Austin three years ago for work and has been relying on local TV news and Reddit for current events. He's highly analytical and prefers data-driven reporting. He's comfortable with technology but overwhelmed by the sheer volume of news sources available. Marcus tends to read articles on his phone during his commute and values concise, well-sourced journalism that helps him stay informed without getting lost in opinion pieces.

### Situation

Marcus heard colleagues discussing NYT's coverage of a major tech industry layoffs story during a team meeting yesterday. He realized he's been missing important national news that affects his industry. His current news diet of Reddit and local Austin news isn't giving him the comprehensive, reliable reporting he needs to make informed decisions about his career and investments. He's considering a digital subscription but wants to explore the site first.

## Key Questions

- Does NYT have strong technology and business reporting that's relevant to software engineering?
- How much does a digital subscription cost and can I try it before committing?
- Is the mobile experience good enough for reading during my 25-minute commute?
- How does their tech coverage compare to TechCrunch or other sources I already follow?
- Do they have newsletters or podcasts that summarize the most important stories?
- Will I get overwhelmed by too much political news if I subscribe?
- Can I customize what types of articles I see first?

## What They Need

Marcus needs to quickly assess whether NYT provides value for his specific interests in technology and business news. He wants to see sample articles, understand the subscription model, and test the mobile reading experience. Given his analytical nature, he needs clear information about what's included and how to customize his news consumption.

## Visit Experience

The persona was blocked by an anti-bot challenge (recaptcha\_v2) on all 3 attempts. The site couldn't be evaluated.

## Reaction

The site presented a recaptcha\_v2 challenge that persisted across 3 attempts. A real human visitor might have solved it; our test infrastructure could not.

## Decision & Next Steps

Visit blocked by anti-bot challenge.

## Persona 2: Rosa Martinez, 67

Finding specific education policy coverage (Looking for in-depth analysis and opinion pieces on current education legislation) -- Phoenix, AZ

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### Personal Description

Rosa has been a loyal NYT subscriber for over 20 years, starting with the print edition and transitioning to digital five years ago when her eyesight made the small print difficult. She reads the news every morning with her coffee and considers herself well-informed about politics and education issues. Rosa is moderately comfortable with technology but sometimes struggles with website navigation changes. She values in-depth reporting and has strong opinions about education policy.

### Situation

Rosa saw a brief mention on the local Phoenix news about a controversial new federal education policy being proposed, but the coverage was superficial. She remembers that NYT usually has excellent education reporting and wants to find their detailed analysis of this policy. She also wants to check if there are any opinion pieces about it since she's considering writing a letter to her congressional representative.

### Key Questions

- Where can I find NYT's coverage of the new federal education funding proposal?

- Are there opinion pieces from education experts about this policy?
- Has anyone written about how this might affect Arizona schools specifically?
- Can I easily share articles with my book club members who also care about education?
- Why does the website layout look different than it did last month?
- Is there a way to save articles I want to reference later when writing my letter?
- How do I find the Education section - it used to be easier to locate?

### What They Need

Rosa needs intuitive navigation to find education-related content and clear organization of articles by topic. She needs larger text options and straightforward sharing features. Since she's a longtime reader, she needs consistency in layout and easy access to both news articles and opinion pieces on education topics.

## Persona 3: Jayden Brooks, 24

Accessing specific article about student loans (Hit paywall, looking for free access or alternative content, budget-conscious) -- Milwaukee, WI

### Personal Description

Jayden works evening shifts at a downtown Milwaukee restaurant and picks up college classes during the day when he can afford them. He gets most of his news from TikTok and Instagram but doesn't have any paid news subscriptions. He's politically engaged and cares about social justice issues but finds most traditional news sources boring or too expensive. Jayden is very comfortable with social media but less familiar with traditional news websites and their paywalls.

### Situation

Jayden saw people on Twitter arguing about a NYT article regarding student loan forgiveness policies, with some saying the reporting was biased. Curious about what the actual article says, he clicked a link someone shared. He hit a paywall after reading the first paragraph but wants to see if he can access the full article somehow, or if there are other free articles about student loans he can read to form his own opinion.

### Key Questions

- Why can I only read one paragraph of this article about student loans?
- Is there any way to read NYT articles for free if I'm a student?
- Are there other articles about student loan forgiveness that I can access?
- How much does a subscription cost and is there a student discount?

- Can I get a free trial to read this article and cancel before being charged?
- Does NYT have a different price for people who just want to read occasionally?
- Are there summaries of their articles available somewhere else?
- Why do people say NYT is worth paying for when I can get news free elsewhere?

## **What They Need**

Jayden needs clear information about free access options, student pricing, and trial subscriptions. He needs to understand the value proposition of paid journalism versus free sources. The site should make it easy for him to explore subscription options without feeling pressured, and provide transparent pricing information.

## **Visit Experience**

I started trying to find a search function to look for that student loan forgiveness article I was blocked from reading, but clicking the search button just seemed to expand some content without giving me an actual search box. When I saw the \$1/week subscription offer, I got excited thinking it might be affordable, but then I discovered it jumps to \$7.50/week after 6 months - that's like \$30+ a month, which is way out of my budget as a student. I spent a lot of time digging through their subscription pages hoping to find student discounts or free trials, but there was no clear information about either. The most promising thing I found was that schools and universities can get group subscriptions, which made me wonder if my college already has access that I don't know about. However, the site didn't provide any way for me to check if my school has a subscription or how I could access it. I ended up in the U.S. news section hoping to find student loan articles, but I never did find that original article I wanted to read. The whole experience felt like being led in circles - every page seemed designed to get me to subscribe rather than help me understand my options.

## **Questions Answered by the Site**

The site clearly answered my question about subscription costs - I found the \$1/week introductory offer that becomes \$7.50/week, plus a mention of 50% off the first year. I also learned that schools can get group subscriptions, which partially answered my question about student access, though it didn't tell me how to check if my school has one. However, the site completely failed to answer most of my other questions. I never found information about student discounts, free trials, or occasional reader pricing. I couldn't find the original student loan article or

discover other accessible articles on the topic. There was no explanation of why their journalism is worth paying for compared to free alternatives, and no mention of where I might find article summaries elsewhere.

## Reaction

I felt frustrated and overwhelmed by the site's focus on getting me to subscribe without helping me understand my options first. The pricing seemed designed to look cheap initially but then becomes expensive, which felt misleading. I was impressed that they offer group subscriptions for schools, but annoyed that they didn't provide a way for me to check if my college already has access. The whole experience made me feel like they don't really care about students who can't afford full subscriptions - there was no acknowledgment of different financial situations or alternative access methods.

## Decision & Next Steps

I'm going to check with my college library to see if they have NYT access through a group subscription - that seems like my best bet for free access. If not, I'll probably try to find that student loan article summarized on a free news site or look for the same information from other sources. I might also ask other students on social media if they know of any ways to access NYT articles affordably. The subscription prices are just too high for my budget right now, especially without knowing if the content is really worth it.

| Can I get a free trial to read this article and cancel before being charged?   | No  | Despite browsing multiple subscription pages and FAQs, I never saw any mention of free trials - only paid introductory offers.  |
| Does NYT have a different price for people who just want to read occasionally? | No  | All the pricing I saw was for full subscriptions with different time commitments, but no pay-per-article or occasional reader options were mentioned.                         |
| Are there summaries of their articles available somewhere else?                | No  | This wasn't addressed anywhere on the NYT site, which makes sense since they want people to subscribe rather than find content elsewhere.                                     |
| Why do people say NYT is worth paying for when I can get news free elsewhere?  | No  | While I saw descriptions of what's included (news, games, cooking, etc.), there was no explanation of their journalism's unique value compared to free news sources.          |

## Findings and Recommendations

**Follow-up intent:** 0 of 1 personas (0.0%) decided to take a follow-up action after evaluating the site. 2 of 3 personas were excluded because they didn't finish (1 anti-bot, 1 other).

Browserbase wall-clock cost (estimated): **\$3.2972** across 7 session attempt(s), 5 anti-bot retry attempt(s).

On average, personas were able to answer **25.0%** of their questions using the website.

### Follow-up breakdown (one bucket per persona):

- walked\_away × 1

**Exploration depth note:** 1 of 3 personas (100.0%) used all 12 turns before reaching a conclusion. Running with **max\_turns=16** or higher would likely reveal more about how users explore the site when not time-constrained.

## Strengths

- Clear subscription pricing information is available for users who can access the site
- Subscription offer structure (\$1/week introductory rate) is prominently displayed

## Weaknesses

- Critical accessibility failure - anti-bot challenges (recaptcha\_v2) completely blocked 2 out of 3 users from accessing any content
- Search functionality appears broken or non-functional, preventing users from finding specific articles they're seeking
- Paywall creates immediate barrier without providing sufficient free content for evaluation
- Subscription pricing structure is misleading - introductory rate jumps significantly (\$1/week to \$7.50/week) making it unaffordable for budget-conscious users
- No clear pathway for users to access the specific content they're looking for (education policy analysis, tech industry coverage, student loan articles)
- Site fails to demonstrate value proposition before requiring payment commitment
- Technical implementation issues prevent basic site navigation and content discovery
